WEBINARS

CONFERENCES AND MEETINGS 2024

JOINT 5TH ICICJ AND ESSIC 2024, KYOTO, JAPAN 21-23 AUGUST 2024

A highlight of this year for the IC/BPS world will undoubtedly be the meeting to be held in Kyoto, Japan entirely devoted to IC/BPS. This will be the Fifth International Consultation on Interstitial Cystitis, Japan (ICICJ) and will be held jointly with the Annual Meeting of the International Society for the Study of Bladder Pain Syndrome (ESSIC) 2024. It will take place from Wednesday 21 August to Friday 23 August 2024.

Further information concerning this exciting upcoming conference will be available in the coming months. In the meantime, reserve the date in your calendar!

For the younger generation, it may be interesting to say something about the history of ICICI meetings in Kyoto. The very first ICICI meeting was organised 21 years ago in 2003 by Dr Tomohiro Ueda in the beautiful historic city of Kyoto. It was a unique and memorable international gathering of experts from many different countries, attended by both doctors and patient advocates. At that time there was no global consensus on the nature of the

disease, the definition was unclear and there was no international clinical guideline. Many patients were not getting a diagnosis and in many countries it was even claimed that IC did not exist in their country!

The first ICICJ with its workshops and discussion groups revealed the extent of the gaps. A start was made on obtaining global consensus on the disease. At the second ICICJ in 2007, group discussions were held on terminology, definitions, diagnosis, and evaluation, attended by participants from all over the world including the Asia-Pacific Rim, Americas, and European regions. At the third ICICJ in 2013, two new sessions were organised with the theme of "Expression & classification based on pathophysiology". At the fourth ICICJ (2018), consensus was reached that bladder pain syndrome and Hunner Lesion are separate entities requiring different treatment approaches. However, the diagnosis of Hunner Lesions depends on cystoscopy which is not compulsory in the United States for example.

It is hoped that the upcoming 5th ICICJ conference this year will be of value not only for clinicians involved in patient management but also for those involved in developing new treatment modalities and those planning research in the future. A main theme of the meeting will be "Diagnostic support using AI-based machine learning algorithms (AINAFHIC) in cystoscopic evaluation of Hunner lesions".

The EAU 2024 congress includes a **Patient Day**, organised by the EAU Patient Office, on Friday 5 April from 09.00 to 15.45 hrs, Room W08 Green Area, which offers a platform where healthcare professionals (HCPs) and patient advocates can meet to share perspectives and experiences. The Patient Day programme will start at 09.00 with the Patient Abstract session. The session themes include **Roundtable #3: Inflammatory Bladder** to be held at 13:30 - 14:30 in the Green Area W08 and will be chaired by Dr Dick Janssen and Jane Meijlink. This session will focus on three inflammatory bladder conditions: Interstitial Cystitis/Bladder Pain Syndrome, chronic radiation-induced cystitis and ketamine-induced cystitis.

In addition to the EAU24 Patient Day, there will be patient-centred sessions included in the EAU24 scientific programme. You can improve your digital communication skills in the Handson Training course ChatGPT for Beginners, designed in a collaboration between the Patient Office and ESU. Or you can connect directly with patient advocates over a coffee in the Patient Lounge (D80).

Patient advocates can register for the congress for free and are eligible to apply for a €500 travel grant. A letter is required stating why you want to attend the congress and you must agree to submit a post-congress report, describing your congress experience and areas for improvement. EULAR provides excellent background information for the rheumatic comorbidities of IC/BPS.

CURRENT IC/BPS SITUATION: AN UPDATE

- Still no consensus

While awareness of IC/BPS has hugely improved worldwide in the past 20 years, there is still no global consensus on definitions, evaluation methods or even what the disease actually is. Definitions appear to have become so loosely worded that many patients are being diagnosed with IC/BPS when they may in fact have some other nearby disorder which may be sensitising the urinary bladder or may have pain caused by damage from previous surgery in the pelvic floor and/or in organs neighbouring the bladder.

It goes without saying that no treatment intended for IC/BPS is likely to work in misdiagnosed patients who consequently get more and more desperate by the day. It is therefore vital now to make every effort to achieve the right diagnosis in the right patient, hopefully then leading to the right treatment. However, this takes time, resources and money, all of which are in short supply in today's world and getting shorter by the year. It also takes expertise which is often not always at hand for rare, less common and complex diseases. And IC/BPS certainly features among the complex diseases!

- Confusing Terminology

Ever since Interstitial Cystitis first appeared in the medical textbooks, terminology has been confused and confusing. However, in an era of electronic medical records and databanks, multiple different names for approximately the same condition leads to chaos for patients, providers, insurance companies, health authorities and – importantly – researchers.

It is time for everyone involved in IC/BPS to sit round a table – together with patient advocates and their organisations - and try to agree on a name! Please!

- ESSIC clinical guideline

ESSIC (the International Society for the Study of IC/BPS) is currently working on the development of a new clinical guideline with an international team from different parts of the world. A major challenge!

ROLE OF PATIENTS IN HELPING TO ACHIEVE THE RIGHT DIAGNOSIS

Patients themselves can play an important role in helping to obtain the right diagnosis by keeping a detailed record of their medical history, any prior surgery, and exactly when the bladder pain/discomfort and urinary symptoms started. People mistakenly believe that this will all be in the computer somewhere and that information is electronically exchanged between hospitals and doctors by just pressing a button. This is usually not the case and particularly today when people move from hospital to hospital, city to city and country to country with their medical information often in a different language. A clear record of a patient's medical history – and where relevant family medical history - will help to provide a meaningful background for diagnosis and help avoid misunderstandings.
